
Santa Fe Trail M/C Meeting February 13, 2022

The notes below are what Jim was able to jot down during the meeting.

- 1. Treasure's Report: Doug Rollert gave a detailed report on the Lawrence Show. Those who attended the meeting were given a copy of the report. More than one person was very appreciative of getting the report so soon after the Show.
- 2. One of the new members, Jon Green, who signed up at the show attended this meeting shared his motorcycle experience.
- 3. It was decided that we would continue to send out "thank you" letters to the vendors and those who brought bikes to show, but to no longer give free membership cards for SFT nor AMCA.
- 4. It was decided to only allow vendors to bring one extra person for free. They may pay the entry price for any additional people they want to attend.
- 5. Make certain that the posters and flyers state very obviously that the Show is on the first Sunday in February.
- 6. Although in the meeting of November 14th it was decided to allow free entry to the show to those who have an active AMCA membership, no mention was made to allow current SFT members in free. It was discussed at this meeting that SFT members were always allowed in free. Therefore, the next show will allow SFT members and AMCA members in free.
- 7. Reduce the number of T-shirts ordered.
- 8. The Twisted Oz Bike Show and Swap Meet will April 9th.



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The Harry R Geer Company

Time for another antique motorcycle ad and a few comments about that motorcycle company. Last issue I highlighted the Thor motorcycle, made in Illinois. This time lets talk about a Missouri motorcycle manufacturer, The Harry R. Geer Company of St. Louis.

Harry Geer's company began as a mail order house in 1902, selling almost anything for motorcycle's of that time period, enabling an individual to repair, modify or build a complete motorcycle on their own.

Around 1904 Geer began to buy complete motorcycles from various manufacturers and re-branding them in his own name. Three motorcycles; the Geer Green Egg, the Geer Blue Bird and the Geer Model 4 were actually manufactured by Hercules, Mitchell and Reliance.

Green Egg: Belt drive, 5 hp 350 cc v-twin, 165 lbs, \$225 Blue Bird: Belt drive, 4 hp single cylinder, 150 lbs, \$200 Model 4: Belt drive, 2.5 hp single cylinder, 125 lbs, \$150

Geer also manufactured their own engine castings, both single and double cylinder engines. Interestingly enough is that the double cylinder was a 5 hp water cooled engine.

One reference book states that the last advertisement from the Geer Company was in 1911, yet I have a magazine page from 1913-14 still advertising the Harry R. Geer Co.

One web site (findagrave.com) notes:

Harry R Geer,

Motorcycle dealer, builder and racer. He had a shop at 1017 Pine Street [St. Louis] downtown and later a place at 856-858 Mclaran Ave in Baden. He lived at 8408 Halls Ferry Road at the time of his death.

Died of injuries from a motorcycle accident - running into the back of a milk cart.

Age 27 Buried on May 25, 1904

Was this Harry R. Geer the founder of the company or was he a son? Who owned or ran the company after his death? I haven't an answer to those questions.


Tech Talk

I've always felt that one thing missing from our newsletter or club membership are Tech Tips, How To's or an evening at someone's house for Show 'n Tell (hey I am over 70 and remember those days in grade school). Jack Larson would be a good resource but he doesn't do computers (but it's a short visit to his shop or by phone), but there are others that could share their knowledge in various ways.

So with that said, here's my 'How I did it':

My son has a 1961 Harley-Davidson Hummer, that's a small 165 cc single cylinder 2 stroke engine motorcycle, that I'm working on. It's more of a re-build rather than a restoration. I've rebuilt the wheels with new bearings and spokes and now I have to redo the brakes. I ordered new brake linings (<u>HarleyHummer.com</u>) and they came with no pre-drilled holes for the rivets.



So how am I going to drill those holes? Drilling the through hole would be easy. I made a reference mark on one of old brake shoes to line up the new linings for drilling. Next I clamped a new lining on to the brake shoe and use my hand drill to drill though the existing 1/8 inch holes.

Now I have to flip the linings over and drill out for the head of the rivets.

If I do that free handed it might work, but it would be sloppy, the hole will wonder and will not be flat bottomed or at a standard depth.



Since the I.D. radius of the linings were close enough to 4 1/2 inches I bought a short piece of Schedule 40 pipe with the same outer diameter.



My procedure would work equally well in a drill press but I'm fortunate to have an old Bridgeport mill.

Next I set the Schedule 40 pipe in my mill vice, found top dead center and drilled a 1/8 hole part way in. Then I cut a short piece of 1/8 diameter rod that I had laying around and tapped it into the hole with a small hammer.





Problem solving is one of the things that I enjoy about motorcycle builds. Sometimes I can do it, other times not. After that I filed the top of the 1/8 rod since tapping it in had mushroomed the top a little. I then slid an old brake shoe lining over the stud, gaged how much was sticking up over the rivet head depression and milled it off, finishing with another quick filing to give it a little chamfer.

Next was to fit a small mill bit with the same diameter of the existing rivet hole. I set the depth gauge so that all the hole depths would be the same. And finally I was able to drill (or mill) all the holes. Mill one hole, pick up the brake lining, move it to another hole and repeat.

One done, three more to go.


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
